OCTOBER DATES TO REMEMBER

13th- 1775 – The continental Congress established the Continental Navy (predecessor of the United States Navy-1792) – In Washington, D.C.

14th - Columbus Day - A day of observance in which the arrival of Christopher Columbus arrived in the America in the Bahamas in 1492

27th- Navy Day - A day to celebrate the achievements and sacrifices and contributions of the U.S. Navy and to recognize those men and women who serve in the Navy.

When someone thinks of November, usually we think of Turkey, family gatherings, football and leftovers. All those are good things but this month also brings Veteran's Day on November 11 of every year. This day is set aside to publicly honor and commemorate the living Veterans. Originally called "Armistice Day" it was established in 1926 by a



congressional resolution. Twelve years later it was changed by another resolution to become a National Holiday. In 1954 President, Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a bill proclaiming November 11 as Veteran's Day, but in 1968 a law was passed to establish the fourth Monday in October as the day to honor Veteran's Day. This change bothered many Americans and it was eventually changed in 1978 back to the original November 11th date for good. But truly we should be honoring all our Military personnel past and present all year long, not just at special times because a calendar says so.

If you are going to have some dinner or recognition at your post home why not make up a poster with this information on other lesser-known military holidays or birthdays and as people wander around and visit or are in line for food, they will be able to be "educated" on these. And you guessed it, it also counts for a goal on your guide sheet.
